The Board of Directors of the Friends Committee on Legislation of California (FCLCA) has finalized its recommendations for the November, 2020 General Election. FCLCA's full analysis of its recommendations is forthcoming and will be published later this month.

Proposition 14: Bonds for funding stem cell and other medical research. **Vote No.**

Proposition 15: Increases funding for schools, community colleges and local government services by changing the tax assessment of commercial and industrial property. **Vote Yes.**

Proposition 16: Allow state and local entities to consider race, sex, color, ethnicity and national origin in public education, public employment and public contracting to the extent allowed under federal and state law. **Vote Yes.**

Proposition 17: Persons on state parole who are U.S. citizens, residents of California, and are 18 years of age would become eligible to vote. **Vote Yes.**

Proposition 18: Allow eligible 17-year olds who will turn age 18 by the next general election to vote in the primary and any special election preceding the general election. **Vote Yes.**

Proposition 19: The Home Protection for Seniors, Severely Disabled, Families and Victims of Wildfire or Natural Disasters Act. **Vote No.**

Proposition 20: Criminal Sentencing, Parole and DNA Collection. **Vote No.**

Proposition 21: Expands local governments' authority to enact rent control on residential property. **Vote Yes.**

Proposition 22: Changes employment classification rules for app-based transportation and delivery drivers. **Vote No.**

Proposition 23: Authorizes state regulation of dialysis clinics and establishes minimum staffing and other requirements. **Vote No.**

Proposition 24: Amends consumer privacy laws. **Vote No.**

Proposition 25: Referendum on replacing money bail system with a system based on risk to public safety. **Vote Yes.** *(Note: a Yes vote on Proposition 25 is a vote to retain the state law to end the money bail system that was put on hold by this referendum.)*
